Evaluation Process and Comments:

The BVCH Projects Committee (Committee) met regarding planning for the upcoming review and evaluation of the 2022/2023 CoC Special NOFO as well as a review of the timeline and evaluation process, including score sheets for evaluating projects and the main application developed from the Special NOFO. After this initial meeting, it was determined that the scoring process was very similar to the Regular CoC competition process Rural Set Aside application on October 6, 2022. In preparation for the review of the application, the Committee reviewed the 2022 Special NOFO, the Projects Committee completed last month, and we could each score applications independently, and exchange questions via email.

questions and discussions via email. The HU-provided rating and ranking tool was used to project thresholds and conduct a tentative ranking of Review and Evaluation: The Projects Committee members reviewed the main application and project application independently, exchanging two potential projects, then the simple score sheet was completed by all committee members for the one project application to be submitted and

based on this criterion and score system. The Committee separately reviewed and scored the main application independently. The Committee dentified areas that affected the overall ranking of the main application (as stated below) in a group discussion on 9/9/2022 and 9/26/22. Feedback Main Application Review: The Committee utilized the scoring criteria identified in the 2022 Special NOFO and used a main application review was provided to the Lead Agency. Committee members provided a signed PDF of their evaluation, which was averaged in the above chart based on a 79-point system (with one new project).

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special NOFO to provide for a standard objective evaluation based on information provided in the application for new projects. The SSO-CE was 4 Project Review and Evaluation: In the review and evaluation process, the CoC Committee utilized the scoring information provided in the 2022 maximum points. The Committee also used the HUD-provided rating and ranking tool to evaluate new projects and discussed their evaluations. Two project applications were reviewed and evaluated for ranking, though the applicant agency ultimately decided to submit only one project for All applicable reports (such as PIT, APR's, etc.) were sent to the Committee to use in their review and ranking. Additional information such as past monitoring is by HUD, and equity factors were reviewed, with no concerns. All Committee members provided copies of their signed evaluation and score sheets to the Chair via email on October 19, 2022. The Committee determined they would add all Committee member scores, average and prioritize according to the average score. Each Committee member would add their own comments to their individual score sheets as they determined appropriate. It was determined by the Projects Committee, through their average that the only project application for the local CoC should rank 1, with an average score of 3.66. We recommend full funding for the lone project application. This summary was reviewed and agreed upon by all committee members. The Committee scheduled a meeting for Nov. 10, 2022 to review the general process for next year and develop concrete action steps to improve the process for evaluating the continuum of care application, recruit new committee members, and encourage community organizations working with homeless populations to participate, both in the Projects Committee and to consider applying for funding in future cycles.

1. Threshold Requirements.

- a. Ineligible Applicants. HUD will not consider a project application from an ineligible project applicant, including an application submitted for CoC planning funds or UFA Costs from a project applicant other than the Collaborative Applicant.
- b. Project Eligibility Threshold. HUD will review all projects to determine if they meet the following eligibility threshold requirements on a pass/fail standard. If HUD determines that the applicable standards are not met for a project, the project will be rejected. Approval of project applications is not a determination by HUD that a recipient is compliant with applicable fair housing and civil rights requirements.
 - (1) Project applicants and potential subrecipients must meet the eligibility requirements of the CoC Program as described in 24 CFR part 578 and provide evidence of eligibility required in the application (e.g., nonprofit documentation).
 - (2) Project applicants and subrecipients must demonstrate the financial and management capacity and experience to carry out the project as detailed in the project application and the capacity to administer federal funds. Demonstrating capacity may include a description of the applicant/subrecipient experience with similar projects and with successful administration of SHP, S+C, or CoC Program funds or other federal funds.
 - (3) Project applicants must submit the required certifications as specified in this NOFO.
 - (4) The population to be served must meet program eligibility requirements as described in the Act, 24 CFR part 578, and Section II.B.4 of this NOFO.
 - (5) Project applicants, except Collaborative Applicants that only receive awards for CoC planning costs and, if applicable, UFA Costs, must agree to participate in a local HMIS system. However, in accordance with Section 407 of the Act, any victim service provider that is a recipient or subrecipient must not disclose, for purposes of HMIS, any personally identifying information about any client. Victim service providers must use a comparable database that meets the needs of the local HMIS.

- (2) Project applicants must demonstrate they will be able to meet all timeliness standards per 24 CFR 578.85.

HUD reserves the right to reduce or reject a project application from the project applicant for the following reasons:

- (a) outstanding obligation to HUD that is in arrears or for which a payment schedule has not been agreed upon;
- (b) audit finding(s) for which a response is overdue or unsatisfactory;
- (c) history of inadequate financial management accounting practices;
- (d) evidence of untimely expenditures on prior award;
- (e) history of other major capacity issues that have significantly affected the operation of the project and its performance;
- (f) history of not reimbursing subrecipients for eligible costs in a timely manner, or at least quarterly; and
- (g) history of serving ineligible program participants, expending funds on ineligible costs, or failing to expend funds within statutorily established timeframes.
- d. Certification of Consistency with the Consolidated Plan. Each project applicant must submit a certification by the jurisdiction in which the proposed project(s) will be located that the applicant's project application for funding is consistent with the jurisdiction's HUD-approved consolidated plan. The certification must be made in accordance with the provisions of the consolidated plan regulations at 24 CFR part 91, subpart F. Form HUD-2991 must be completed and dated between June 22, 2022 and October 20, 2022. Additionally, applicants that locate a project on a reservation or trust land must include a

tribal resolution to site a project on their own reservation or trust land or a letter from an official or principal of the Indian Tribe or TDHE who is authorized to act on behalf of the Indian tribe or TDHE indicating approval. A tribal resolution is the formal manner in which the tribal government expresses its legislative will in accordance with its organic documents. L. 112-141, 126 Stat. 405), activities under this NOFO are subject to environm1ental review by a responsible entity under HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58.
 - (1) For projects categorized as exempt or Categorically Excluded from review under the National Environmental Policy Act and not subject to 24 CFR 58.5 (CENST), the <u>Exempt/CENST</u> form is only required for each project, not every unit.
